Palazzo Grassi in Venice to Host Dali Centennial Exhibit in 2004

hile many expected the country of Spain to host a major exhibit commemorating the 100th birthday of Salvador Dali, it has now been announced that the Palazzo Grassi in Venice, Italy will reopen after its recent remodeling with an exhibition celebrating the Dali Centennial.

The show will be produced with the cooperation of with the Gala and Dali Foundation of Figueres and with the Salvador Dali Museum of St. Petersburg, Florida.

According to Giuseppe Donega', vice president of Palazzo Grassi, "During the months leading up to the exhibition we will explore Dali's contacts with the cinema, minor arts, and literature. Dali' will be the thread linking our

initiatives in 2004, and this exhibit supports the image of Dali as the brilliant artist he truly was."

The Salvador Dali Museum in St. Petersburg, Florida will lend the exhibit the 19 most significant Dali works out of its overall collection of 98. Organizers are still trying to figure out how to transport and display *The Hallucinogenic Toreador*, which is too large to be brought inside the Palazzo Grassi.

In February 2005, the exhibition will move to the United States, where it will be housed at the Philadelphia Museum of Art.

Dali Museum in Spain Acquires Three Women Imitating the Movements of a Sailing Boat

he Gala-Salvador Dalí Foundation acquired *Three Women Imitating the Movements of a Sailing Boat* at Sotheby's, New York November 5, 2002, for US \$669,500. Dalí completed this work soon after he and Gala moved to the United States at the outbreak of World War II.

In 1942, Dalí enthusiastically spoke about the paintings that he had completed since coming to America:

"Since my arrival I have painted eleven new important pictures and several murals...When two and a half years ago, I arrived to live and work in America, it was unanimously predicted that the lack of European atmosphere would be fatal.

"It was prophesied that removed from the stimulus of Paris I would end by immobilizing myself in a nostalgic waiting for a return. "I believe I have already disproved this by categoric arts: America has only developed, to the extent of a paroxysm, one of the most characteristic and almost monstrous `secrets' of my personality - my capacity for work."

This particular painting, *Trois femmes imitant les mouvements d'un voilier (Three Women Imitating the Movements of a Sailing Boat)*, Dalí executed in 1940, is one of these eleven important paintings to which he refers. It was featured in a retrospective exhibition of the artist's work at The Museum of Modern Art in 1941 that included 43 pictures and 16 drawings. James Thrall Soby referrs to it in his introduction to the exhibition catalogue:

"In the years immediately prior to the outbreak of the war Dalí made three extended visitis to Italy. The effect of these visits has been increasingly evident in his paintings. Not only has he close familiarity with the great Italian tradition still further moderated his disdain for established esthetic standards, but the impact of this tradition has altered and widened his own technical means....

"In [*Three Women Imitating the Movements of a Sailing Boat*] the background figure, constructed of circular brushstrokes, seems directly inspired by Bracelli's figures composed of typographer's scrolls, while the rushing tension between the foreground figures is prefigured in certain paintings of the Italian Baroque such as Guido Reni's famous Atalanta and Hippomenes."

Prior to the sale, this work formed part of the Robert C. Guccione collection, while it had formerly belonged to Galleria Internazionale, the Raymond Milo collection of New York and the collection of Mrs. Harold F. McCormick of Chicago, who acquired it directly from the artist.

Salvador Dali Chronology

s the Dali Centennial approaches, we thought our readers might be interested in a quick overview of Dali's life:

[1904]... May 11th, born in Figueres, Catalunya, Spain.

[1910]... Attends the Immaculate Conception, primary school, run by Christian Brothers.

[1916]... Summer vacation with the Pichot family, where Dali encounters modern painting.

[1917]... Senor Nunez teaches the young artist the techniques of chiaroscuro and original engraving.

[1919]... First public exhibition in a group show at Municipal Theater in Figueres. Dali is 15 years old.

[1922]... Dali passes his entrance examination to the Academia de San Fernando in Madrid.

[1923]... Suspended from Academia de San Fernando for allegedly taking a leading part in a protest.

[1925]... First professional solo exhibition at Galeria Dalmau in Barcelona.

[1926]... First trip to Paris and Brussels. Visits Picasso in his studio. Expelled from the Academy, after refusing to take an examination.

[1928]... Publishes the Yellow Manifesto with Luis Montanya and Sabastia Gasch, denouncing the established value and culture.

[1929]... Collaborates with Luis Bunuel on the short film Un Chein Andalou. Meets Gala Aluard. First exhibition; catalogue introduction by Andre Breton. Formally invited to join the Surrealist group in Paris.

[1930]... Settles at Port Lligat, Spain with Gala Eluard.


[1931]... *Paints* The Persistence of Memory.

- [1934]... The Enigma of William Tell offends the Surrealist group, and they later expel him. Civil marriage to Gala. Visits New York. Albert Skira publishes 42 original engravings by Dali, titled Les Chants de Madoror.
- [1935]... The Conquest if the Irrational, with the "paranoiac-critical method," published in New York and Paris.
- [1936]... Appears on the cover of Time magazine on the occasion of "Fantastic Art, Dada and Surrealism" exhibition at the Museum of Modern Art, New York. Paints Autumn Cannibalismand Soft Construction with Beans Premonition of Civil War.
- [1938]... Obtains interview with the ailing Sigmund Freud in London. Takes part in the Paris International Surrealists Exhibition.
- **[1939]...** Finally expelled from the Surrealist group for unwillingness to support their political motives.
- [1940]... Dali and Gala emigrate to America where they lived for eight years, first in Virginia, then at Pebble Beach, California, and last at the St. Regis Hotel in New York.
- [1941]... Retrospective exhibition, shared with Joan Miro, at the Museum of Modern Art in New York.
- [1942]... Publication of fictionalized autobiography, The Secret Life of Salvador Dali.
- [1946]... Animated film project, Destino, for Walt Disney. Does set design for dream sequence in Alfred Hitchcock's Spellbound. Paints The Temptation of Saint Anthony.
- [1949]... Paints Leda Atomica and The Madonna of Port Lligat. Returns to Europe.
- [1951]... Paints Christ of St. John of the Cross and Exploding Raphaelesque Head.
- [1957]... Joseph Forest Publishes 12 original lithographs by Dali titled, Page Choisies de Don Quichotte de la Mancha (Don Quixote).





Stolen Dali Painting Recovered in Madrid from *Reuters News Service* April 4, 2003



The Motionless Swallow, valued at \$323,600, was found in an antique shop in Madri, Spain which had acquired it "in good faith" from a Barcelona art dealer, police said in a statement.

The painting, along with a number of antiques, had been stolen from a private home in Girona province in the northeastern region of Catalonia, not far from Dali's home town of Figueres.

The painting had then been taken to several European countries, and one of the three suspects attempted to auction the work in London on June 25 last year through Sotheby's auction house.

More Dali Sightings

im Erlick, a former marketing executive and president of The Erlick Group, an entertainment sponsorship consultancy firm in New York City, recently told us about his encounter with the master back in the mid 1960s.

From the time Jim was ten years old until the age of 25 he collected autographs in person and through the mail of famous people from all aspects of our culture. Over the years he collected more than 10,000 signatures of sports heroes, explorers, actors, musicians and even some of the politicians involved in Watergate. Dali's signature was a highly-prized addition to his collection.

"As a teenager, I knew that Dali lived at the St. Regis Hotel in New York," Jim explains. "So one day I showed up in the lobby with a couple of Dali books and prints hoping to get an autograph. I was a great little schmoozer, so I immediately made friends with the

doorman, who told me that Dali came down every day for lunch at exactly 11:00 a.m.

"So the next day, I called Dali's room from the house phone just before 11:00 and told him that I was an art student and would be honored if he would sign a couple of pieces I had with me down in the lobby. Dali listened indignantly, curtly said he had no time, and hung up abruptly.

"But at exactly 11:00, the elevators opened and out he came," says Jim. "The doorman had mentioned that Dali was a creature of habit, and sure enough, here he was, right on schedule. Without letting him know that I was the guy who'd just harassed him on the phone, I introduced myself, and he was very warm and receptive. He signed my books and my *Persistence of Memory* poster, we chatted for a while, and he was an absolute gentleman."

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Dali's Hotels by Nigel Simmins

ali spent a great deal of his time living in two of the world's great hotels, the Meurice in Paris and the St. Regis hotel in New York. But why did he choose these particular properties?

The Meurice, apart from being one of the best hotels in Paris (I should know, I used to work there), had been the home for a while of King Alphonso XIII, the last king of Spain before Franco took over. This obviously appealed to Dali, and he always occupied the same "Royal" suite (106-8) as the king did. As Dali once said, "the divine arse sits on the same






toilet seat that the King had used" or something like that....

And why the St. Regis? Again it was/is one of the best hotels in New York and at the time a very "snobbish" place to stay and be seen (which appealed to the master's enormous ego). The hotel was pleased to have a great artist on its guest list and consequently gave him good terms.

Incidentally, under the King Cole bar where Dali used to hold court, was an area that once a week was transformed into an ice rink which was in those days unique to a New York hotel. Further -- and this is probably a coincidence -- the St. Regis opened its doors in 1904, the year of Dali's birth. Dali's old suite, #1610, has since been refurbished and is now called "The Presidential Suite."

Who is Albert Field?

or more than 40 years, with the written permission and enthusiastic support of Salvador Dalí, Albert Field has been assembling and maintaining Dalí's official archives in New York City and is the founder of THE SALVADOR DALI ARCHIVES.

Over the years, Mr. Field maintained frequent contact with Dali at his home in Spain, and in New York and Paris. In the course of his research, Field has made more than 40 trips to Europe, and two to Japan, visiting museums and private homes in 13 countries, and assisting in the preparations of Dali exhibitions in New York, Montreal, Paris, Stuttgart, Zurich, Tokyo, Barcelona and Madrid.

He has been responsible for educating and informing the world about the life and works of Dali via his media interviews on programs such as "60 Minutes," and in several documentary films on Dali's life. He's also translated original articles by Dalí for publication in books and magazines, and has written on the art of Dalí.

But perhaps most important to Dali collectors is Field's assembly of *The Official Catalog of the Graphic Works of Salvador Dali*, which was published in 1996 with the help of Dali Gallery director Bruce Hochman. The book is the definitive source for information on Dali's graphic works, and the only way a collector can determine if a piece is truly authentic (see ad, page 7).

Albert Field has assisted in eighteen government investigations of possible art fraud and has testified in several court cases, always being accepted by the court as an expert on Salvador Dali. Many museums and galleries have referred owners of Dalí works to The Dali Archives.

- [1958]... Gala and Dali have religious marriage ceremony at Girona, Spain.
- [1962]... Enters ten-year agreement with publisher Pierre Argillet to produce various text illustrations.
- [1963]... Illustrates an edition of The Divine Comedy published in Paris.
- [1967]... Purchases Pubol Castle in Gerona.
- [1969]... Gala moves to Pubol Castle to live on her own.
- [1971]... Opening of Salvador Dali Museum, Cleveland, Ohio.
- [1974]... Dali begins to have major health problems.
- [1976]... The Unspeakable Confessions of Salvador Dali *published in English. Paints* Gala Contemplating the Sea.
- [1980]... Dali, in failing health, returns to Spain and goes into seclusion
- [1982]... Salvador Dali Museum opens in St. Petersburg, Florida. Death of Gala.
- [1983]... First major exhibition of his work in Spain, in Madrid and Barcelona. Completes his final painting The Swallow's Tail.
- [1984]... Dali is seriously burned in a house fire at his home in Figueras.
- [1989]... January 23, Dali dies of heart failure at Figueres. He is buried in the crypt of the Tatro Museum, Figueres, Spain.

"Ever since impressionism, the decline of the art of painting has been impressive."


The Dalí Adventure - Art@2:00 Film Thursday, June 26 2:00 pm

Iberia Airlines Puts Dali Name on a Plane

ala-Salvador Dalí Foundation chairman Ramon Boixadós has announced that Iberia Airlines has officially joined the Dalí Year Promotion Committee. Iberia becomes the third company to join the committee, after the publishing group Grup Planeta and the Spanish state broadcasting station RTVE did so recently. An Iberia representative said that the company would be placing the artist's name on a new plane, an Airbus 340-600, which would be coming into service in June this year.

Referring to the announcement, Dalí Foundation chairman Ramon Boixadós said, "Salvador Dalí will once again be flying through the sky." Dali had previously created a work for Iberia which was on exhibit in the first-class compartment of an Iberia airliner for a time and is now displayed in the board of directors' meeting room at Iberia's head office.
